Dear Parents and Guardians,

As we reach the end of another exciting and rewarding year at Penketh High School we look back positively on the further improvements that have been made across the school this year.

In September we introduced a wide ranging enrichment programme across the school, offering pupils the opportunity to immerse themselves in activities that extend their usual classroom curriculum. I'm sure parents will be aware that over 50 enrichment clubs have been operating across each half term of the year, giving pupils the opportunity to engage in a variety of experiences related to academic, cultural, STEM, arts or sporting pursuits. This agenda has been driven around supporting the holistic development of pupils and providing them with experiences that help to spark lifelong passions. We're pleased with the high levels of engagement from pupils and would like to thank the staff for their dedication and commitment in running these sessions; predominantly during their lunch period.

In addition to school based experiences we have been pleased to enhance our offer of residential trips to pupils to support their wider understanding of their cultural and academic pursuits. These have included a Year 7 residential trip, a languages trip to Spain, Duke of Edinburgh, university residential trips—including one to OxBridge - and also the World Challenge expedition to Costa Rica for some Year 10 and 11 pupils.

This wider development of pupils is really important to us as a school as we recognise that it's these aspects that can enhance engagement of pupils in their academic endeavours and also help to set them apart when applying for college, university or employment. We plan on continuing to build on this wider curriculum offer for pupils next year and look forward to discussing this with pupils in September.

We've been extremely pleased with the development of our school library ready for September. Most of you will know that whilst I've been Principal for two years, I've been at the school for a considerably longer period. During this time I've never felt that the library provision at the school has been good enough and it's essential for a school driving improvements in academic standards to have this resource. It allows us to support pupils with literacy which is a key skill to ensure success in their academic pursuits, but also ensures that we can secure a love of reading which will serve our young people well beyond their time at Penketh. The new library has thousands of books available for pupils, so it really is a great resource - but we'll always find a place for more books. If you are perhaps getting rid of some books we would be grateful if you'd consider donating these to our school library and we have installed a book drop off point in reception.

The academic development of students is of paramount importance to us as we look to ensure that pupils have the best opportunities available to them beyond their secondary education and we're looking forward to sharing results day with our Year 11 pupils in August and celebrating successes with them. Pupils will be able to collect their GCSE results between 8:30am and 11am on Thursday 22nd August.

I'd like to thank the staff for their hard work and dedication across the year. Improvements that have been driven through the school have been as a result of their hard work and commitment to providing the best educational provision for our pupils. It's also as a result of the pupils rising to the challenge and meeting our high expectations, for which they should be congratulated.

Calculator Camp

On average pupils completed 6 papers and a range of calculator based skill development tasks across the weekend. Even with all that maths we still also managed some much needed down time including an afternoon at the beach, a dip in the bracing Irish Sea and an outdoor cinema viewing of Bohemian Rhapsody (which led to some questionable singing being heard across the Holyhead bay area!)

This is now a staple of the Year 11 readiness programme and 'Calculator Camp' 2020 is already booked for the next crop of intrepid mathematicians.

After another delivery of books, Izzy & Evie spent hours helping to scan the now 1500 titles into our new stock management system so we will know exactly who has our books out on loan.

On Thursday the 11th July we were excited to host author Rob Parker who officially opened our lovely new library, where he cut the ribbon, gave an inspirational talk and followed this up with a writing workshop with a group of Yr7s and 8s.

We know that our new library really sets the tone for our school, and highlights our push to raise levels of literacy and foster a love of both reading and learning for our pupils here at Penketh High. We are very much focused on continuing to drive academic standards at the school and a library is an important development to help us build on those improvements already secured.

In June our MFL Department left behind the sunny sights of Penketh and flew 40 Year 9 and 10 pupils to Barcelona to allow our pupils to be fully immersed into the Spanish culture. Pupils spent four action packed days in the Catalan city getting accustomed to the Spanish way of life by practising their linguistic capabilities and sampling typical delicacies of the region – (much to the pupils' surprise 'los calamares' were not onion rings)! The pupils took in a variety of iconic tourist attractions during their stay such as La Sagrada Familia where pupils listened to an audio guide detailing the work of Gaudi and his unfinished masterpiece, both pupils and staff alike enjoyed learning about the history of the building and some were even inspired to use photos for their GCSE art projects next year. The second day saw the group visit El Camp Nou, home to Barcelona Football Club where pupils had a tour of the stadium and visited the impressive trophy room (the Everton fans amongst them couldn't believe their eyes). Pupils also visited Gaudi's Parc Güell, a mosaic paradise, and after a mammoth walk to the top of the park they experienced 360 degree views over the whole of Barcelona, a memorable visit for our pupils. Digital Curriculum AT PENKETH

It's been a pleasure to introduce the digital pathway for all pupils across Year 7 to 10 this year. Pupils within these year groups have had the opportunity to undertake sessions in rapid prototyping, physical computing, 3D printing, Raspberry Pi coding, data visualisation and game design. It's important to us to provide pupils with these digital experiences in a rapidly changing and increasingly digital world. These experiences extend the usual parameters of the classroom and allows us to deliver skills through a bespoke curriculum designed in consultation with industry leaders. This provides pupils with insight as to what can be studied at University but also gives them the chance to see Maths, Science and Technology in action.

Liverpool MakeFest

Penketh High School this year was asked to coordinate all the media and interviews for the biggest digital making event in the UK, Liverpool MakeFest. It's a celebration that explores how science, technology, engineering, arts and crafts are shaping our world. Now in its fifth year, MakeFest has grown into a key UK event which attracts makers, creators, artists and musicians from all across the UK and internationally.

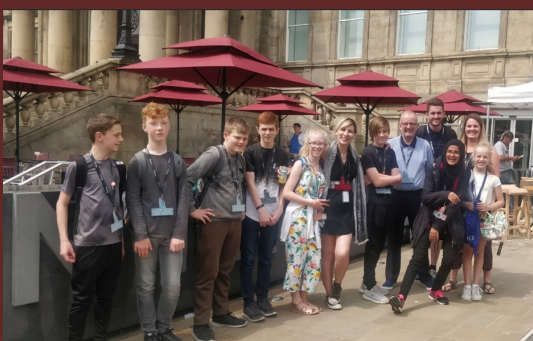
Deputy Mayor of Liverpool and Cabinet Member for Business, Economy and Skills, Cllr Gary Millar added: "Events like Liverpool MakeFest are extremely important for the future of our city. In fact, originally it was my fascination for computers that brought me to this great city. Therefore, I know first-hand that making technology interactive and fun can help ignite a spark in young and old. This could be the beginning of your very own journey of discovery and excitement."

"You will have the opportunity this weekend to find that MakeFest is your perfect introduction to the exciting world of technology, gadgets, games, robots, craft and advice."

Penketh Students worked together with the company We Heart Tech, a pioneering design, tech and media company in Liverpool. Leading the key interviews and showcasing the projects built by makers across the UK, a compilation of this work completed by pupils will be available in the next few weeks and shared nationally.

Mrs Smith and Dr Gardner joined our students in not only showcasing the electronic robotics and Internet of things projects they had worked on over the year, but also got involved with the immersive interactive exhibits including coding drones and using the latest in augmented reality hardware. We were also exceptionally proud of the work pupils have produced to participate in the world's biggest 3D print. The print, known as the "Eagle" rocket currently stands at 20.5ft and will be judged by the Guinness Book of World Records in November.

Pupils who had worked on the Museum project were proud to see their work form earlier on in the year, a 3D scanning and augmentation project on display with Create Education and Hewitt Packard. Congratulations to all our year 8/9 pupils who have been working on this.





World ORT Training

Sharing our expertise is important to us at Spark Penketh. So it was pleasing that Ms Keep was asked by The CREATE Education Project to deliver a maker education programme to 20 international teachers at the 16th annual World ORT Hatter Technology Seminar, which took place at ORT House in London from June 24-27.

The World ORT's annual Hatter technology seminar provides an opportunity for 20 of ORT's professional educators from all over the world to explore the latest developments in STEM teaching and learning. Each year a specific pedagogical or technological theme is addressed, recent themes have included STEM Curriculum 2020, Nanotechnology, Robotics, and Integrated approaches to STEM. During an intensive week of themed master-classes, lectures, workshops and visits, delegates get to learn from each other as well as from leaders in the field and build professional relationships that continue long after the seminar ends, often stimulating international collaborations. The theme of this year's seminar was "Bringing the Maker Culture into our schools".

Jodene Pereira from the ORT-affiliated King David High School Linksfield in Johannesburg, South Africa said of the event:

"I feel that the Hatter Seminar has not only impacted me professionally, but I feel that it has had a big impact on me personally too. Professionally, I sometimes face issues as a maker and trying to bring in new ideas into a profession that has been around for centuries has its difficulties – but I know now that I have a very big support system, not only in my school, but thanks to this last week, around the world. We laughed, we learnt, we collaborated, we shared, we failed and kept trying. It was the true essence of what Maker Culture is all about and I am truly fortunate to have been a part of it all thank you so much."
