Dear Parents and Carers,

We reach the end of a short week as we mark the 75th anniversary of VE Day during the national bank holiday today. The school remained open across bank holiday for both vulnerable children and the children of key workers. Those of us in school took the opportunity to remember a generation of people who made tremendous sacrifice, a generation to whom we remain eternally grateful. Pupils engaged in activities relating to such a momentous occasion in our national history, including a research activity and a VE Day picnic for lunch.

As it is indeed a bank holiday live lessons were not conducted as normal, but these resume from Monday continuing to follow the pupils' school timetable that they would usually follow in school. We were thrilled with how successful our virtual careers day was on Wednesday. Whilst we have worked swiftly to ensure that our curriculum offer was in place for pupils during the period of closure, we've also been committed to providing pupils with a wider enrichment offer. You will know how important enrichment and the wider development of pupils is to us as a school; we offer in excess of 60 different enrichment clubs for pupils to undertake, have a comprehensive career programme and a dedicated personal development curriculum. Despite pupils not being able to engage in these things at this time, we feel it incredibly important that we do whatever we can to offer wider opportunities beyond the taught curriculum, despite the obvious challenges we face.

Our virtual careers day was a huge part of our remote enrichment provision and I'd like to pass on my thanks to Mr Musgrove who led on the coordination of this event in collaboration with our partners at the Pledge and Higher Horizons. The day provided a range of interactive workshops and presentations from employers, colleges and higher education providers. The level of interaction from our young people was staggering, with over 1782 messages recorded throughout the day, asking thoughtful and insightful questions. The questions demonstrated that pupils have adopted a wonderfully mature attitude and are clearly thinking about their futures and their next steps. We were so proud of them and how they took advantage of the opportunity and the feedback we received from our external partners was full of praise for our outstanding young people.

Each Monday we also issue our Enrichment Bulletin document, this is distributed to pupils via Teams and is also placed on the school website; the edition from this week can be found at https://www.penkethhigh.org/wp-content/uploads/2020/05/Enrichment-Week-3-4th-May.pdf. 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
