Exquisitely formed sentences are fired-off in smarting succession, and the juxtaposition of contemporary totems like Burger King buildings with the likes of folk saint shrines is smartly done. This is a richly layered novel in which important socio-political issues (gangs, poverty, corruption, migration, social divisions and dissonance) are made potently real through Arturo and Faustino's predicaments. And alongside the enlightening Mexico-specific context, there's much that is universal: friendship, loyalty, and searching for a sense of purpose. As paternal figure Siggy tells Arturo, "You just have to find out what it is you're looking for." Pacey and passionate, this truly exceptional book tells a tale that truly needs to be heard.

Treacle Town

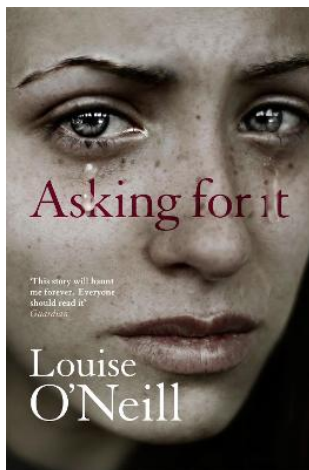
October 2023 Book of the Month Set in the author's hometown of Coatbridge, this hard hitting, shockingly authentic and unforgettable novel will sadly be all too relevant to far too many other places where poverty, gang violence and substance abuse are rife. He is shining a light on overlooked and ignored communities and the metaphor of the title is poignantly apt for the young people who can see no way out and no future. It opens with a funeral and ends with one, young lives brutally and needlessly cut short. Our narrator is Con, a young man who is no stranger to death, his mother took her own life, and his father has since retreated into a competitive bodybuilding obsession. Friends are all he has left, but, while grieving for Biscuit, killed by a rival gang, he has no desire, despite constant goading, to perpetuate the grim cycle of retribution and revenge. Con, Wee-Z, Trig and Nails are all vividly created characters and the banter between them is fast, often funny, sometimes furious and always foul mouthed, but unmistakably realistic. The book is labelled as unsuitable for younger readers and that is undeniable, but nevertheless this is a book which needs to be read and which should be a wakeup call to those with the power to do something about the future for young people and communities. Although a tough read there is hope for redemption. Con discovers slam poetry, discovers there is something that maybe he can do, something that can help him break free, rekindling ambition and father son relationships. A hope that survives the guilt and despair of the grim conclusion. This is Conaghan at his brilliant, heartbreaking best. An absolute must-read.

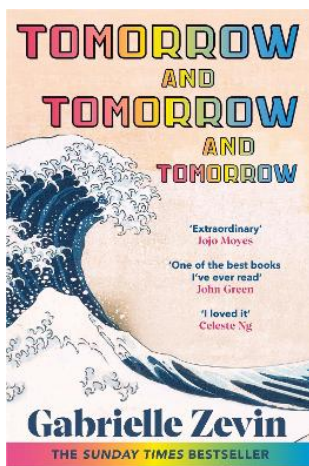

We see their seedy, poverty-stricken, real worlds and the glamorous 'virtual' world of possibility that they can access through VR suits whenever they choose. At the heart of the story is Wade Watts, a boy who might—JUST—have the skill (and knowledge of obscure 80's cultural references) to win a competition which will make him the richest person in the universe—and the most powerful to boot! Of course there are evil forces out to stop him and this provides a most gripping climax to the tale. A perfect book for any teenager or young adult obsessed with games and game culture—or parents with fond memories of Dungeons and Dragons etc., from a misspent youth!



Asking For It

Covering two time periods, a year apart, a vivid picture emerges of Emma. Emma is a fascinating character, bright and beautiful, she loves to be the centre of attention, however she is manipulative and able to use her looks to her advantage. Beneath the surface, there is much more to discover, and as her story is written in the first person, a fuller picture of Emma starts to emerge. Louise O'Neill describes the events that occur with consideration, yet most importantly with a frank honesty, meaning at times this is not only an uncomfortable but also aching difficult read. Distressing, bleak yet compelling, this is a significant novel that will encourage contemplation and discussion, about a painful and challenging subject. This title is recommended for older teens due to the content.

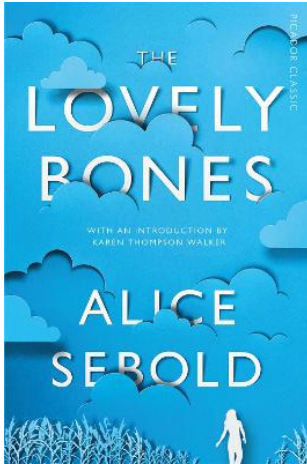


Tomorrow, and Tomorrow, and Tomorrow

What a beautiful, heart-wrenching story from a writer with exceptional talent for delivering extraordinary story contexts with so much humanity. Gabrielle Zevin's *Tomorrow, and Tomorrow, and Tomorrow* is a devastating, nourishing novel that unlocks truths about love, life, and bone-deep bonds of a lifetime. Refreshingly, the novel also explores the power of work and play - "To allow yourself to play with another person is no small risk. It means allowing yourself to be open, to be exposed, to be hurt...To play requires trust and love." As one of the main characters remarks, commenting in his capacity as a creator of visionary video games: "There is no more intimate act than play, even sex." In 1987, it was through play that Sam and Sadie struck up a close friendship in childhood when she was the only person he'd talk to in hospital after surviving a terrible car accident. After a falling out, they encounter each other again by chance when she's a student at MIT and he's at Harvard. She gives him a disk of a computer game she's working on, *Solution*, which pushes gamers' ethics to the limits. Together they create a game, and form a soulful bond, with *Ichigo*, their game and its Sam-like protagonist, very much their baby. After commercial success in their early twenties, Sadie and Sam fall-out over what to create next, with Sam imploring Sadie to make a third *Ichigo*: "You can't abandon our child in a shitty sequel". As they become luminaries of the gaming world, with old college friend Marx at the business helm, the imperfections of the real world infringe on the thought-provoking worlds Sam and Sadie have devoted their lives to creating. There's painful tragedy and failure alongside the money and glory, with the needs, flaws, and complexities of each character incredibly evoked. As Sadie

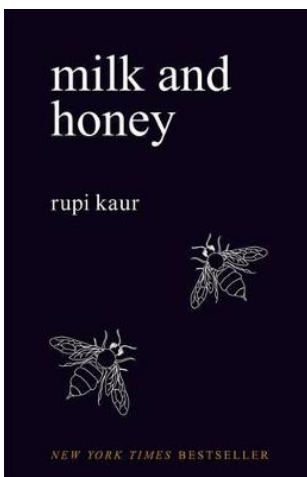
remarks, "How strange and beautiful human beings are. And how fragile". This novel, too, is strange and beautiful, and presents a powerful presentation of human fragility.

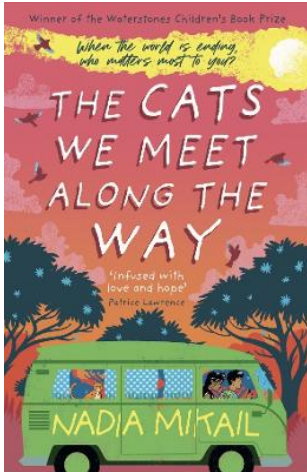

February 2022 Debut of the Month | Winner of the Waterstones Childrens Prize 2023 | Shortlisted for the Branford Boase Award 2023 | Shortlisted for the YA Book Prize 2023 When dynamic independent children's publisher Guppy Books put out a call for submissions from unpublished, un-agented writers in 2020, Nadia Mikail answered with *The Cats We Meet Along the Way* - a poignant debut with a punch-packing, end-of-the-world set-up, and unconditional love at its heart. Through its deeply endearing characters, this tells a stirring story of family finding a way through loss, loneliness and feeling abandoned to embrace what's really important. Until the Announcement "Aisha had been a seventeen-year-old student, who treasured her lie-ins and whose mother shouted about breakfast to wake her up. Now time was precious". And the Announcement? Nothing less than the imminent end of Earth, with predictions of "the world wreathed in fire and smoke" in the fatal wake of an asteroid collision. How's that for a mind-blowing set-up? But that's not all Aisha has to deal with. Three years ago, before the Announcement, her older sister, June, left home and hasn't been seen since: "she had chosen to disappear from their lives without a trace, and had chosen not to come back". Now, mere months before the world will end, Aisha and her mother Esah want to find June, so they embark on an emotional road-trip across Malaysia with Aisha's adorable boyfriend, his compassionate parents, and Fleabag the cat. Though the scenario is urgent, the author has a powerfully steady style, as seen in her measured, bone-deep evocations of memories, and characters' mourning of memories that will never be made - their sorrow and grief is profoundly palpable. Then there's Aisha and Esah's deep-rooted connection to the place they were born, where they hope to find June, and an unleashing of pent-up anger, grief and guilt before a love-filled sense that light may be found through even the darkest of days.

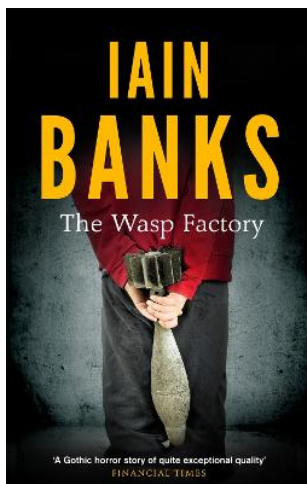


Beautiful Broken Things

16-year-old Brightonians Caddy and Rosie have been best friends all their lives, their relationship enduring even when Caddy's aspirational parents send her to a private school. But when an enigmatic new girl arrives at Rosie's comprehensive, Caddy's longing for "something of some significance to happen" in her "hopelessly average" life is set in motion, along with a shift in the dynamic of her relationship with Rosie. While Caddy is initially terrified that the beautiful, impulsive Suzanne will replace her, the three of them form a deep friendship. As Suzanne's self-destructiveness escalates, it emerges that she's struggling to cope with the ordeal of having suffered physical abuse at the hands of her stepfather, and Caddy finds herself laying everything on the line to save her downward spiraling friend. This powerful, punch-packing debut is an utterly compelling, authentic portrait of the intricate ebbs and flows of

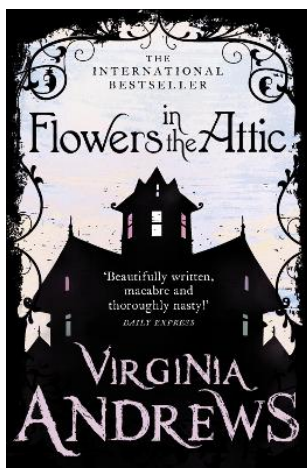

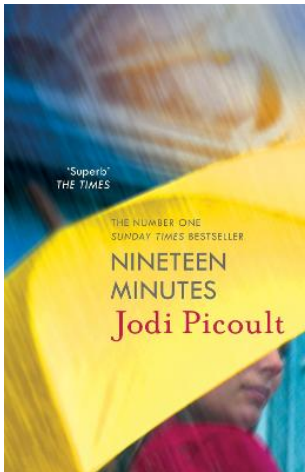
April 2023 Debut of the Month A stunning debut that makes full and highly skilled use of the narrative verse format, with imaginative use of font and layout, to tell an important story that the author acknowledges is based upon the real experiences of a friend's son. It highlights how easy it is for young people and children to be entrapped by ruthless drug gangs. But this portrayal of Erik goes far beyond a single issue, it is a thoroughly nuanced, credible portrait of a young man and the complexities of his life. It had been difficult due to bullying and rapidly worsens with the death of his father and then his mother's terrible choice of new partner, who abandons her and their new twin daughters, leaving Erik as her only support. Poverty and sleeplessness take their inevitable toll and behaviour and grades fall. Erik slowly finds himself abandoning his loyal friend Ravi and hanging out more and more with his former tormentors Travis and Ben and their dubious friends. Skipping school turns into shoplifting which turns into drug running. At first, it's easy money and almost a new kind of family. But the casual drop-offs soon escalate, as do the lies and deception. When Erik tries to escape the dark world he's fallen into, his baby sisters come under threat. But a powerfully realistic ending offers a credible way out of the dangerous situation Erik and his family are facing and directs readers to sources of help for those facing similar issues. Erik remains a likeable, self-aware, almost brutally honest protagonist throughout. He should not be defined by his bad choices but neither does he excuse his behaviour. In his portrayal the author shows that those involved in county lines activity should rightly be treated and perceived as victims rather than perpetrators - a stance campaigned for by the Children's Society (who checked the manuscript for authenticity) This is an outstanding and important novel that should be widely read by parents and teachers as well as by the young people who will find it gripping, relatable, authentic and unputdownable. 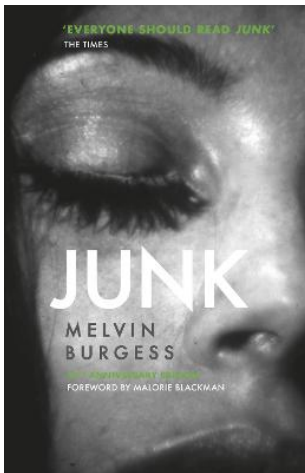

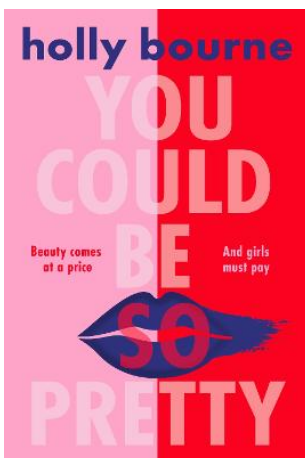

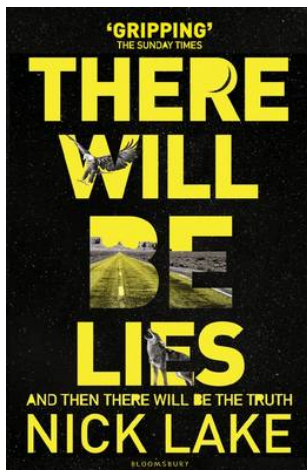

A love triangle, of sorts, between its two main characters and their addiction to heroin, once read *Junk* is never forgotten. It strikes deep with unflinching power, never shirking from truths that need to be told, which it does from multiple compelling viewpoints, and with incredible empathy. Smart and thoughtful Tar has been blighted by abuse at the hands of his parents. In contrast, middle class Gemma has attentive parents, which has driven them to strictness, and drives her to leave home. Both on the streets of Bristol, Tar and Gemma fall in together, and fall in love, though it's not long before they tumble into a spiral of drug-related devastation. In a novel packed with agonising episodes, perhaps most poignant of all is witnessing Tar and Lily convince themselves they're in control of their heroin addiction, but since it's exactly that - an addiction - they are not, and their story will cut to your soul.



You Could Be So Pretty

Belle and Joni live in a society firmly controlled by the Doctrine; Belle is a loyal follower, Joni is not. Belle is the most successful Pretty in school, a Chosen One and soon to be crowned winner of The Ceremony – she Has It All. Joni is Objectionable, she is hated by everyone for her repulsive looks and opposition to the Doctrine. The Doctrine insists that the Bad Times are over, that True Equality has been achieved and every woman has a choice how they live. But when a woman's worth is judged solely on appearance, how much choice does she really have? This is a scathing comment on modern image-obsessed society, which holds a mirror up to much of the ridiculous expectations and controls placed on women of all ages. With hugely impressive skill, Bourne has created a world that is undoubtedly familiar, but distant enough to allow objective consideration of the societal norms and illusion of choice that Belle and Joni exist under. Language is played with to present familiar objects and concepts in new lights, making the reader consider not only the story presented, but their own lives and society. This is one of those rarest of reading experiences – a book that you consume rather than simply read, a book that will change the reader forever. It will make you both angry and tearful for what women and girls smilingly endure. It belongs in the hands of every teenager and everybody who cares about them.



There Will be Lies

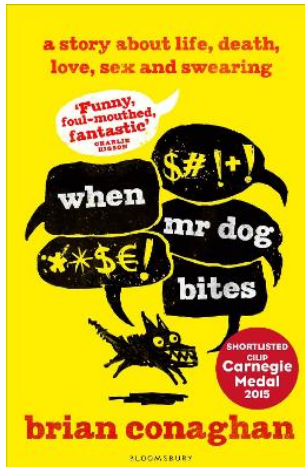

Part-adventure, part-mystery and part a teenager's journey of self-discovery, There Will Be Lies is dramatic and unexpected in equal measure.

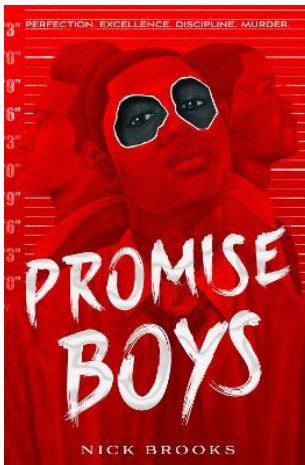

This barnstorming debut was shortlisted for the prestigious Carnegie Medal, and Brian has gone on to write many stunning, award-winning novels for teens and younger readers, including the Costa-winning *The Bombs that Brought Us Together*.



Promise Boys

Brilliantly told from multiple points of view, including secondary sources and media reports as well as narrative voices, this is an intensely gripping and powerful story that really highlights how young people of colour are failed by the education and law enforcement systems that should be protecting them. Trey, J.B and Ramón are three very different characters with different aspirations attending Urban Promise Prep School, which was set up to give disadvantaged kids a second chance. Principal Kenneth Moore runs the place with strict rules and brutal discipline and when he is shot dead while the three are in detention, they become the immediate suspects in his death and they have to join forces to prove their innocence. These characters are extremely well drawn and all the additional sources really build a picture of their community and the challenges they face. Needless to say media reports are biased against the boys from the start, because of their colour and where they are from and it is fascinating to see how the boys are perceived by others and how they see themselves. This is a nuanced and wholly authentic look at societal injustice but wrapped up in a page turning and nail biting mystery which will keep readers gripped and engaged. The author's screen writing background really shows in the vivid scene setting and economy of language. This is an absolute must have for school libraries and a richly rewarding text for classroom study.

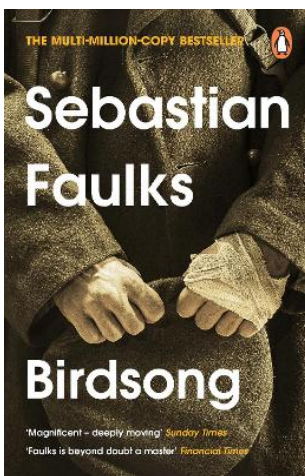


The Great Godden

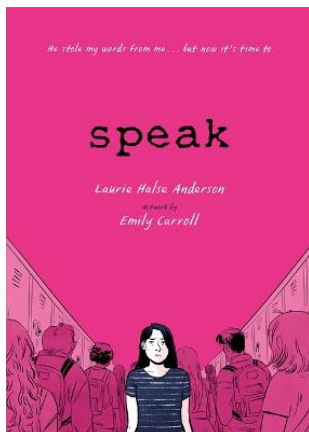
Shortlisted for the YA Book Prize 2021 With characteristic vision and grace Meg Rosoff has done it again in this exquisite novel that merits a place alongside *I Capture the Castle*, *Bonjour Tristesse* and *The Lost Estate* (Le Grand Meaulnes) for its coming-of-age, loss-of-innocence excellence. Though contemporary, it feels timeless and elementally affecting, much like the *Great Godden*'s impact on the family whose story it tells. With an idyllic seaside summer stretching ahead, the tingling anticipation of *The Great Godden*'s unnamed teenage narrator is deliciously palpable: "This year is going to be the best ever: the best weather, the best food, the best fun. The actors assembled, the summer begins." But there are still two more actors to take to the stage - enter the Godden brothers in a shiny black car. The narrator's older sister Mattie is immediately smitten by magnetic, handsome, self-assured Kit: "She was desperate to lose her virginity, and what sort of person would say no to Mattie? Surely not some movie star's kid, fresh off the plane?" Though Mattie is certainly attractive, it's obvious that charmer Kit has the upper hand of any situation, but might he also be a trouble-maker, as his curt, less-of-a-looker brother warns? Such wonderings underpin some of this novel's essence. With the stage fully set and summer speeding towards the climax of a wedding, it poses fundamental questions about motivation, and the nature of agency, of lust, of the desire to be seen for who you are. Quivering with unease, passion and paranoia, it also reveals how past experiences engrave themselves upon us, creating fault-lines that may crack and cause future ructions. Sophisticated, seductive and smoothly readable, this is a summer story par excellence, and a coming-of-age tale for all times.
